

**Description**

Austin Lynx™ II SIP power modules are non-isolated DC-DC converters that can deliver up to 10A of output current with full load efficiency of 95% at 3.3V output. These modules provide a precisely regulated output voltage programmable via an external resistor from 0.75Vdc to 3.63Vdc over a wide range of input voltage ( $V_{IN} = 2.4 – 5.5Vdc$ ). The Austin Lynx™ II series has a sequencing feature, EZ-SEQUENCE™ that enable designers to implement various types of output voltage sequencing when powering multiple voltages on a board.

**CAUTION: This power module is not internally fused. An input line fuse must always be used.**

This power module can be used in a wide variety of applications, ranging from simple standalone operation to being part of a complex power architecture. To preserve maximum flexibility, internal fusing is not included, however, to achieve maximum safety and system protection, always use an input line fuse. The safety agencies require a 15A, time-delay fuse (see Safety Considerations section). Based on the information provided in this data sheet on inrush energy and maximum dc input current, the same type of fuse with a lower rating can be used. Refer to the fuse manufacturer's data sheet for further information.




**Figure 1. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 0.75Vdc).**




**Figure 4. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 1.8Vdc).**




**Figure 2. Converter Efficiency versus Output Current (Vout = 1.2Vdc).**




Figure 7. Input voltage vs. Input Current ( $V_o = 2.5\text{Vdc}$ ).




Figure 10. Transient Response to Dynamic Load Change from 50% to 100% of full load ( $V_o = 3.3\text{Vdc}$ ).




Figure 8. Typical Output Ripple and Noise ( $V_{in} = 5.0\text{V dc}$ ,  $V_o = 0.75\text{Vdc}$ ,  $I_o = 10\text{A}$ ).




Figure 11. Transient Response to Dynamic Load Change from 100% to 50% of full load ( $V_o = 3.3\text{Vdc}$ ).




Figure 9. Typical Output Ripple and Noise ( $V_{in} = 5.0\text{V dc}$ ,  $V_o = 3.3\text{Vdc}$ ,  $I_o = 10\text{A}$ ).






Figure 12. Transient Response to Dynamic Load Change from 50% to 100% of full load ( $V_o = 3.3\text{Vdc}$ ,  $C_{ext} = 2 \times 150\text{ }\mu\text{F}$  Polymer Capacitors).




**Figure 13. Transient Response to Dynamic Load Change from 100% of 50% full load ( $V_o = 3.3$  Vdc,  $C_{ext} = 2 \times 150 \mu\text{F}$  Polymer Capacitors).**




**Figure 14. Typical Start-Up Using Remote On/Off ( $V_{in} = 5.0$ Vdc,  $V_o = 3.3$ Vdc,  $I_o = 10.0$ A).**




**Figure 15. Typical Start-Up Using Remote On/Off with Low-ESR external capacitors ( $V_{in} = 5.5$ Vdc,  $V_o = 3.3$ Vdc,  $I_o = 10.0$ A,  $C_o = 1050\mu\text{F}$ ).**


**Figure 17 Typical Start-Up Using Remote On/Off with Prebias ( $V_{in} = 3.3$ Vdc,  $V_o = 1.8$ Vdc,  $I_o = 1.0$ A,  $V_{bias} = 1.0$ Vdc).**




**Figure 18. Output short circuit Current ( $V_{in} = 5.0$ Vdc,  $V_o = 0.75$ Vdc).**




**Figure 19. Derating Output Current versus Local Ambient Temperature and Airflow ( $V_{in} = 5.0$ ,  $V_{o}=0.75$ Vdc).**




**Figure 22. Derating Output Current versus Local Ambient Temperature and Airflow ( $V_{in} = 5.0$ dc,  $V_{o}=3.3$  Vdc).**




Figure 24. Input Reflected Ripple Current Test Setup.




Figure 25. Output Ripple and Noise Test Setup.




Figure 26. Output Voltage and Efficiency Test Setup.

## Design Considerations

### Input Filtering

Austin Lynx™ II SIP module should be connected to a low-impedance source. A highly inductive source can affect the stability of the module. An input capacitance must be placed directly adjacent to the input pin of the module, to minimize input ripple voltage and ensure module stability.




Figure 27. Input ripple voltage for various output with 1x150 µF polymer and 1x47 µF ceramic capacitors at the input (full load)




Figure 28. Input ripple voltage for various output with 3x150 µF polymer and 2x47 µF ceramic capacitors at the input (full load)

To minimize input voltage ripple, low-ESR polymer and ceramic capacitors are recommended at the input of the module. Figure 27 shows input ripple voltage (mVp-p) for various outputs with 1x150 µF polymer capacitors (Panasonic p/n: EEFUE0J151R, Sanyo p/n: 6TPE150M) in parallel with 1 x 47 µF ceramic capacitor (Panasonic p/n: ECJ-5YB0J476M, Taiyo- Yuden p/n: CEJMK432BJ476MMT) at full load. Figure 28 shows the input ripple with 3x150 µF polymer capacitors in parallel with 2 x 47 µF ceramic capacitor at full load.

## **Design Considerations (continued)**

### **Output Filtering**

The Austin Lynx™ II SIP module is designed for low output ripple voltage and will meet the maximum output ripple specification with 1  $\mu$ F ceramic and 10  $\mu$ F tantalum capacitors at the output of the module.

However, additional output filtering may be required by the system designer for a number of reasons. First, there may be a need to further reduce the output ripple and noise of the module. Second, the dynamic response characteristics may need to be customized to a particular load step change.

To reduce the output ripple and improve the dynamic response to a step load change, additional capacitance at the output can be used. Low ESR polymer and ceramic capacitors are recommended to improve the dynamic response of the module. For stable operation of the module, limit the capacitance to less than the maximum output capacitance as specified in the electrical specification table.

## **Safety Considerations**

For safety agency approval the power module must be installed in compliance with the spacing and separation requirements of the end-use safety agency standards, i.e., UL 60950-1, CSA C22.2 No. 60950-1-03, and VDE 0850:2001-12 (EN60950-1) Licensed.

For the converter output to be considered meeting the requirements of safety extra-low voltage (SELV), the input must meet SELV requirements. The power module has extra-low voltage (ELV) outputs when all inputs are ELV.

The input to these units is to be provided with a fast-acting fuse with a maximum rating of 15A in the positive input lead.

## Feature Description

### Remote On/Off

The Austin Lynx™ II SIP power modules feature an On/Off pin for remote On/Off operation. Two On/Off logic options are available in the Austin Lynx™ II series modules. Positive Logic On/Off signal, device code suffix "4", turns the module ON during a logic High on the On/Off pin and turns the module OFF during a logic Low. Negative logic On/Off signal, no device code suffix, turns the module OFF during logic High on the On/Off pin and turns the module ON during logic Low.




Figure 29. Circuit configuration for using positive logic On/Off.

For positive logic modules, the circuit configuration for using the On/Off pin is shown in Figure 29. The On/Off pin is an open collector/drain logic input signal ( $V_{ON/OFF}$ ) that is referenced to ground. During a logic-high (On/Off pin is pulled high internal to the module) when the transistor Q1 is in the Off state, the power module is ON. Maximum allowable leakage current of the transistor when  $V_{ON/OFF} = V_{IN,max}$  is  $10\mu A$ . Applying a logic-low when the transistor Q1 is turned-On, the power module is OFF. During this state  $V_{ON/OFF}$  must be less than  $0.3V$ . When not using positive logic On/off pin, leave the pin unconnected or tie to  $V_{IN}$ .




Figure 30. Circuit configuration for using negative logic On/Off.

For negative logic On/Off devices, the circuit configuration is shown in Figure 30. The On/Off pin is pulled high with an external pull-up resistor (typical  $R_{pull-up} = 5k$ ,  $+/ - 5\%$ ). When transistor Q1 is in the Off state, logic High is applied to the On/Off pin and the power module is Off. The minimum On/off voltage for logic High on the On/Off pin is  $1.5Vdc$ . To turn the module ON, logic Low is applied to the On/Off pin by turning ON Q1. When not using the negative logic On/Off, leave the pin unconnected or tie to GND.

### Overcurrent Protection

To provide protection in a fault (output overload) condition, the unit is equipped with internal current-limiting circuitry and can endure current limiting continuously. At the point of current-limit inception, the unit enters hiccup mode. The unit operates normally once the output current is brought back into its specified range. The typical average output current during hiccup is  $3.0A$ .

### Input Undervoltage Lockout

At input voltages below the input undervoltage lockout limit, module operation is disabled. The module will begin to operate at an input voltage above the undervoltage lockout turn-on threshold.

### Overtemperature Protection

To provide protection in a fault condition, the unit is equipped with a thermal shutdown circuit. The unit will shutdown if the thermal reference point  $T_{ref}$  exceeds  $125^{\circ}C$  (typical), but the thermal shutdown is not intended as a guarantee that the unit will survive temperatures beyond its rating. The module will automatically restarts after it cools down.

## Feature Descriptions (continued)

### Output Voltage Programming




Figure 31. Circuit configuration to program output voltage using an external resistor.

The output voltage of the Austin Lynx™ II SIP can be programmed to any voltage from 0.75 Vdc to 3.3 Vdc by connecting a single resistor (shown as  $R_{trim}$  in Figure 31) between the TRIM and GND pins of the module. Without an external resistor between the TRIM pin and the ground, the output voltage of the module is 0.7525 Vdc. To calculate the value of the resistor  $R_{trim}$  for a particular output voltage  $V_o$ , use the following equation:

$$R_{trim} = \left[ \frac{21070}{V_o - 0.7525} - 5110 \right] \Omega$$

For example, to program the output voltage of the Austin Lynx™ II module to 1.8 Vdc,  $R_{trim}$  is calculated as follows:

$$R_{trim} = \left[ \frac{21070}{1.8 - 0.7525} - 5110 \right] \Omega$$

$$R_{trim} = 15.004 \text{ k}\Omega$$

By using 1% tolerance trim resistor, set point tolerance of  $\pm 2\%$  is achieved as specified in the electrical specification. The POL Programming Tool, available at [www.lineagepower.com](http://www.lineagepower.com) under the Design Tools section, helps determine the required external trim resistor needed for a specific output voltage.

The amount of power delivered by the module is defined as the voltage at the output terminals multiplied by the output current. When using the trim feature, the output voltage of the module can be increased, which at the same output current would increase the power output of the module. Care should be taken to ensure that the maximum output power of the module remains at or below the maximum rated power ( $P_{max} = V_{o, set} \times I_{o, max}$ ).

### Voltage Margining




Figure 32. Circuit Configuration for margining Output voltage.

Output voltage margining can be implemented in the Austin Lynx™ II SIP modules by connecting a resistor,  $R_{margin-up}$ , from the Trim pin to the ground pin for margining-up the output voltage and by connecting a resistor,  $R_{margin-down}$ , from the Trim pin to the Output pin for margining-down. Figure 32 shows the circuit configuration for output voltage margining. The POL Programming Tool, available at [www.lineagepower.com](http://www.lineagepower.com) under the Design Tools section, also calculates the values of  $R_{margin-up}$  and  $R_{margin-down}$  for a specific output voltage and % margin. Please consult your local Lineage Power technical representative for additional details.

## Feature Descriptions (continued)

## Voltage Sequencing

The Austin Lynx™ II series of modules include a sequencing feature, EZ-SEQUENCE™ that enables users to implement various types of output voltage sequencing in their applications. This is accomplished via an additional sequencing pin. When not using the sequencing feature, either tie the SEQ pin to V<sub>IN</sub> or leave it unconnected.

When an analog voltage is applied to the SEQ pin, the output voltage tracks this voltage until the output reaches the set-point voltage. The SEQ voltage must be set higher than the set-point voltage of the module. The output voltage follows the voltage on the SEQ pin on a one-to-one volt basis. By connecting multiple modules together, customers can get multiple modules to track their output voltages to the voltage applied on the SEQ pin.

For proper voltage sequencing, first, input voltage is applied to the module. The On/Off pin of the module is left unconnected (or tied to GND for negative logic modules or tied to V<sub>IN</sub> for positive logic modules) so that the module is ON by default. After applying input voltage to the module, a minimum of 10msec delay is required before applying voltage on the SEQ pin. During this time, potential of 50mV ( $\pm 10$  mV) is maintained on the SEQ pin. After 10msec delay, an analog voltage is applied to the SEQ pin and the output voltage of the module will track this voltage on a one-to-one volt bases until output reaches the set-point voltage. To initiate simultaneous shutdown of the modules, the SEQ pin voltage is lowered in a controlled manner. Output voltage of the modules tracks the voltages below their set-point voltages on a one-to-one basis. A valid input voltage must be maintained until the tracking and output voltages reach ground potential.

When using the EZ-SEQUENCE™ feature to control start-up of the module, pre-bias immunity feature during start-up is disabled. The pre-bias immunity feature of the module relies on the module being in the diode-mode during start-up. When using the EZ-SEQUENCE™ feature, modules goes through an internal set-up time of 10msec, and will be in synchronous rectification mode when voltage at the SEQ pin is applied. This will result in sinking current in the module if pre-bias voltage is present at the output of the module. When pre-bias immunity during start-up is required, the EZ-SEQUENCE™ feature must be disabled. For additional guidelines on using EZ-SEQUENCE™ feature of Austin Lynx™ II, contact the Lineage Power technical representative for preliminary application note on output voltage sequencing using Austin Lynx II series.

## Remote Sense




Figure 33. Remote sense circuit configuration.

The Austin Lynx™ II SIP power modules have a Remote Sense feature to minimize the effects of distribution losses by regulating the voltage at the Remote Sense pin (See Figure 33). The voltage between the Sense pin and V<sub>O</sub> pin must not exceed 0.5V.

The amount of power delivered by the module is defined as the output voltage multiplied by the output current (V<sub>O</sub> x I<sub>O</sub>). When using Remote Sense, the output voltage of the module can increase, which if the same output is maintained, increases the power output by the module. Make sure that the maximum output power of the module remains at or below the maximum rated power. When the Remote Sense feature is not being used, connect the Remote Sense pin to output pin of the module.

## Thermal Considerations

Power modules operate in a variety of thermal environments; however, sufficient cooling should always be provided to help ensure reliable operation.




Figure 34.  $T_{ref}$  Temperature measurement location.




Figure 35. Thermal Test Set-up.

Considerations include ambient temperature, airflow, module power dissipation, and the need for increased reliability. A reduction in the operating temperature of the module will result in an increase in reliability. The thermal data presented here is based on physical measurements taken in a wind tunnel. The test set-up is shown in Figure 35. Note that the airflow is parallel to the long axis of the module as shown in figure 34. The derating data applies to airflow in either direction of the module's long axis.

The thermal reference point,  $T_{ref}$  used in the specifications is shown in Figure 34. For reliable operation this temperature should not exceed 115 °C. The output power of the module should not exceed the rated power of the module ( $V_{o, set} \times I_{o, max}$ ). Please refer to the Application Note "Thermal Characterization Process For Open-Frame Board-Mounted Power Modules" for a detailed discussion of thermal aspects including maximum device temperatures.

### Heat Transfer via Convection

Increased airflow over the module enhances the heat transfer via convection. Thermal derating curves showing the maximum output current that can be delivered at different local ambient temperature ( $T_A$ ) for airflow conditions ranging from natural convection and up to 2m/s (400 ft./min) are shown in the Characteristics Curves section.

## Post solder Cleaning and Drying Considerations

Post solder cleaning is usually the final circuit-board assembly process prior to electrical board testing. The result of inadequate cleaning and drying can affect both the reliability of a power module and the testability of the finished circuit-board assembly. For guidance on appropriate soldering, cleaning and drying procedures, refer to *Board Mounted Power Modules: Soldering and Cleaning Application Note*.

## Through-Hole Lead-Free Soldering Information


The RoHS-compliant through-hole products use the SAC (Sn/Ag/Cu) Pb-free solder and RoHS-compliant components. They are designed to be processed through single or dual wave soldering machines. The pins have an RoHS-compliant finish that is compatible with both Pb and Pb-free wave soldering processes. A maximum preheat rate of 3°C/s is suggested. The wave preheat process should be such that the temperature of the power module board is kept below 210°C. For Pb solder, the recommended pot temperature is 260°C, while the Pb-free solder pot is 270°C max. Not all RoHS-compliant through-hole products can be processed with paste-through-hole Pb or Pb-free reflow process. If additional information is needed, please consult with your Lineage Power technical representative for more details.


