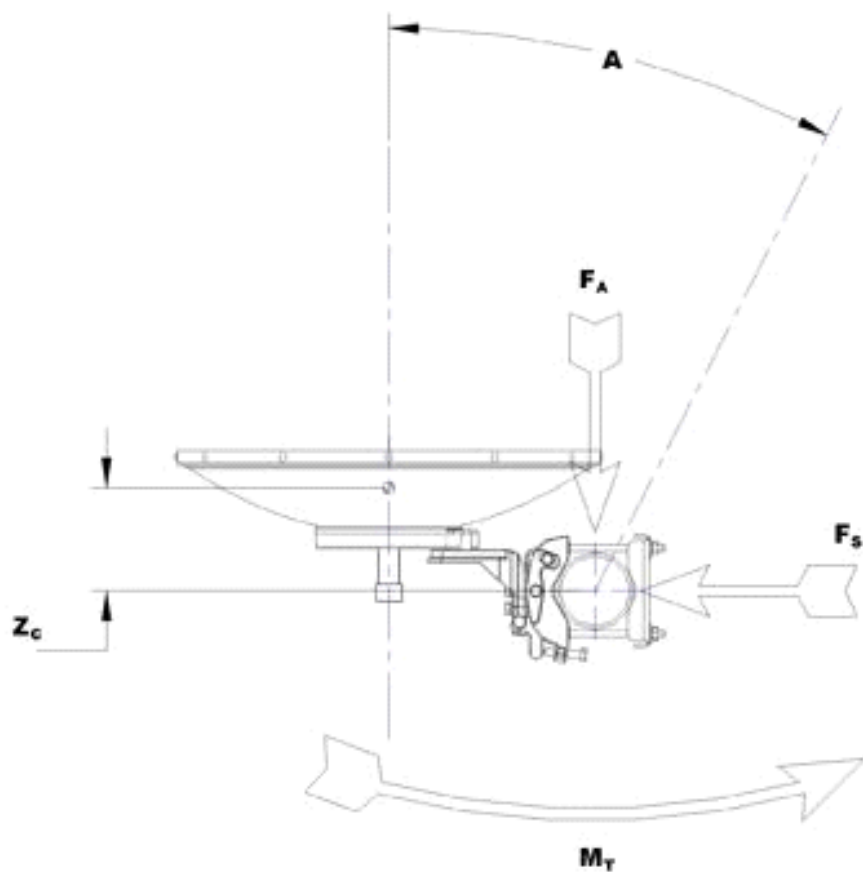

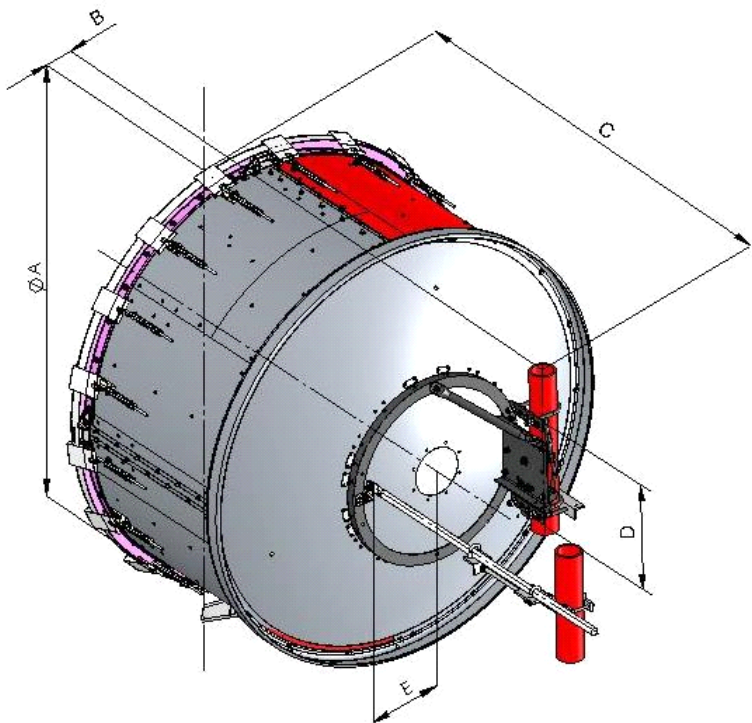
Wind Forces At Wind Velocity Survival Rating Image

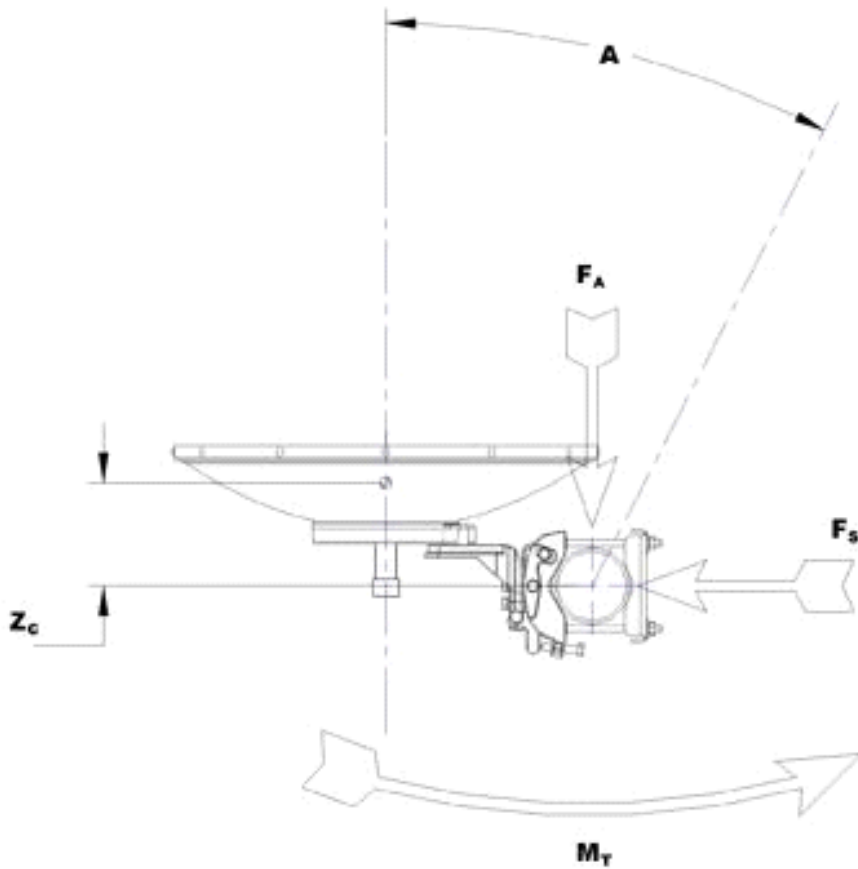

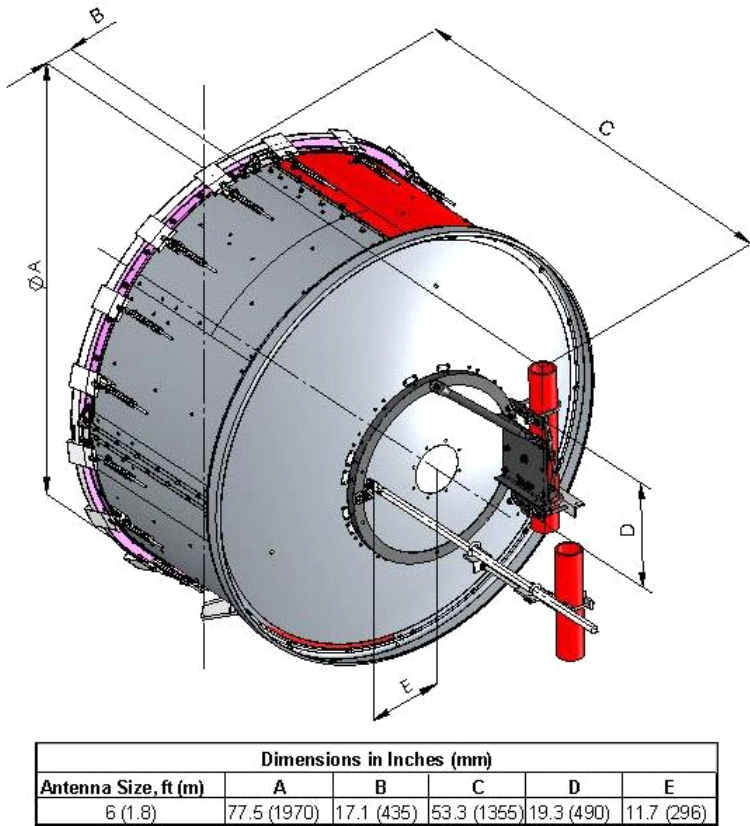
